

CARBON IN THE UPLANDS

With the support from sponsors, the Southern Upland Partnership, The Heather Trust and the Crichton Carbon Centre have joined forces to develop this conference. 20 APRIL -SUSTAINABLE UPLANDS PROJECT WORKSHOP

Francis Brewis, a representative from the Scottish Government will provide the government's view of the importance being attached to keeping carbon on the hills.
